Madras Large Lot UGB Expansion Preliminary Discussions December 2023




Central Oregon Large Lot Industrial Program

- Program that allows cities in Central Oregon cities to expand their UGB for large lot industrial sites
- Program identifies need for the following sites:
 - 3 sites that are 50-100 acres
 - 2 sites that are 100-200 acres
 - 1 site that is 200+ acres
- Program has been used twice:
 - Madras 100-200 acre site for Daimler's Proving Grounds
 - Redmond 200+ acre site

Site Need for Large-Lot Industrial Use

- Jefferson County and Madras jointly submitted a proposal to consider a use of the large-lot program
- Looking at 100 to 199 acre site
- Considering County-owned site of 195 acres on four adjacent parcels
 - Analysis is considering other sites
- Future use would be traded-sector industrial


Most of Madras' Industrial Land is in the northern* part of the City

Madras has no vacant industrial sites over 100 acres in size that are not planned for other uses





Additional Considerations

OAR 660-0024-0067 establishes the following priority of land for inclusion within a UGB:

- First Priority is urban reserve, exception land, and nonresource land.
 - Sites 5 and 6 are in the urban reserves but have steep slopes
- Second Priority is marginal land
 - None in Jefferson County
- Third Priority is forest or farm land that is not predominantly high-value farm land
 - Sites 3 is partially in this category but it does not meet the site needs
- Fourth Priority is agricultural land that is predominantly high-value farmland
 - Sites 2, 8, 9, 10

Next Steps

- Get input from stakeholders, such as property owners
- Refine understanding of site needs for the target industries
- Evaluate the remaining areas based on Goal 14 criteria
 - (1) Efficient accommodation of identified land needs
 - (2) Orderly and economic provision of public facilities and services
 - (3) Comparative environmental, energy, economic and social consequences
 - (4) Compatibility of the proposed urban uses with nearby agricultural and forest activities occurring on farm and forest land outside the UGB

Here is the scope of work we received, "The entire Bi-Mart show barn is to be included in the construction budget of the barn. Microphone and Cord (2x each: 50ft cord for backup) and 2 separate wireless and cord connections/boxes strategically placed for two show rings, and 2 wireless mics."

To summarize, there will be a two wireless microphones in this space and two wired microphone jacks installed too, with a total of four microphones accessible at any given time. You will be able to use this space as two zones or as one. We have added a USB Card on the DSP in this version for future live-streaming capabilities.

Notes:

The customer will need to provide dedicated power at the AV Rack, additionally a network drop at the AV Rack. To run the system remotely you will need to provide us an apple or android tablet to set-up on-site, though a volume control will be in the AV Rack.

There will be a 250' trench with ethernet in it installed and quoted by others, i.e Cove Electric. That price is not included in this proposal. The purpose of this network cabling is to be able to control the entire network of sound systems from any point. If this option is postponed until the future, additional programming and network equipment will be added at that time.







Horizontal Off Axis Response 7, 11




Axial Processed Response (dB) 7,9




Vertical Off Axis Response 7, 11




Axial Processed Phase Response (degrees) 7, 10









Technologies

The CCX1577 incorporates Fulcrum's patented* Passive Cardioid Technology* to overcome one of the major challenges of other loudspeakers: rear LF radiation. This will require a redesign and selection of different products.

Please be advised that if we go to 4 speakers, they will need to be larger (more expensive) and louder than the ones we specified.

Our original design used the speakers in what is called a distributed system. With a distributed system the sound levels are more uniform throughout the seating area. With fewer speakers, to achieve enough level at the farthest seats the nearer seats will be much louder. Additionally, with open sides on the building more sound will "spill" into adjacent areas.



Jefferson County strongly supports the Deschutes River Conservancy's application on behalf of the Crooked River Water Quality Partnership (CRWQP) to the Bureau of Reclamation's Cooperative Watershed Management Program Phase I funding. The Deschutes Basin has a long history of collaborative engagement and a proven track-record for implementing long-lasting solutions to meet water issues in the basin. This Partnership will advance water quality improvements in the Crooked River, a priority for the Crooked River Sub-Basin and the Deschutes Basin as a whole. Continued support for this basin-wide collaboration is critical, and time is of the essence for forging and implementing broadly supported strategies.

The lower Crooked River is an important geography in the context of anadromous fish species reintroduction. Many millions of dollars have been expended thus far supporting efforts to reestablish both Spring Chinook and middle Columbia steelhead (ESA-listed; threatened) in the Deschutes basin. To date, much of this time and investment has been directed to water quantity and in-stream habitat concerns in the Upper Deschutes River basin and the Crooked River. As a major tributary to the Deschutes River, the Crooked River basin represents a particularly important contributor to the water quality concerns of the Deschutes River system as a whole. In addition to impacts poor water quality has on stream ecology, a significant concern is the fact the Lower Deschutes River serves as a primary source of domestic drinking water for the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs, located downstream of the Crooked River, Our organization is excited to support expanded focus on water quality issues within the Crooked River watershed. The result of this effort will be a strengthened and formalized Crooked River Partnership, expanded capacity for the Core Partners within the CRWQP, and will build upon the Crooked River Water Quality Strategic Action Plan to refine prioritized implementation strategies and goals, and develop actions to meet the water management needs of Deschutes Basin tribes, communities, agriculture, and anadromous fish as affected by the Crooked River watershed.

As an organization that is keenly aware of, and deeply invested in the prioritizing of long-term maintenance of our larger regional watershed, Jefferson County both supports and endorses this collaborative effort to address water quality issues in the Crooked River. You can consider Jefferson County a partner and an advocate on behalf of the Crooked River Partnership, its mission, and the watershed management goals it seeks to achieve.



FEMA NFIP Program is outlined in 44 CFR 60.3 – a nutshell is what is required to be adopted by the State and Local Governments to be eligible for the NFIP flood insurance.

§ 60.3 Flood plain management criteria for flood-prone areas.

The Federal Insurance Administrator will provide the data upon which flood plain management regulations shall be based. If the Federal Insurance Administrator has not provided sufficient data to furnish a basis for these regulations in a particular community, the community shall obtain, review and reasonably utilize data available from other Federal, State or other sources pending receipt of data from the Federal Insurance Administrator. However, when special flood hazard area designations and water surface elevations have been furnished by the Federal Insurance Administrator, they shall apply. The symbols defining such special flood hazard designations are set forth in § 64.3 of this subchapter. In all cases the minimum requirements governing the adequacy of the flood plain management regulations for flood-prone areas adopted by a particular community depend on the amount of technical data formally provided to the community by the Federal Insurance Administrator. Minimum standards for communities are as follows:

- (a) When the Federal Insurance Administrator has not defined the special flood hazard areas within a community, has not provided water surface elevation data, and has not provided sufficient data to identify the floodway or coastal high hazard area, but the community has indicated the presence of such hazards by submitting an application to participate in the Program, the community shall:
 - (1) Require permits for all proposed construction or other <u>development</u> in the <u>community</u>, including the placement of manufactured homes, so that it may determine whether such construction or other <u>development</u> is proposed within flood-prone areas;
 - (2) Review proposed <u>development</u> to assure that all necessary permits have been received from those governmental agencies from which approval is required by Federal or <u>State</u> law, including section 404 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972, 33 U.S.C. 1334;
 - (3) Review all permit applications to determine whether proposed <u>building</u> sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed <u>building</u> site is in a <u>flood</u>-prone area, all new construction and <u>substantial improvements</u> shall (i) be designed (or modified) and adequately anchored to prevent <u>flotation</u>, collapse, or lateral movement of the <u>structure</u> resulting from hydrodynamic and hydrostatic <u>loads</u>, including the effects of buoyancy. (ii) be constructed with materials resistant to flood damage.

About 20 years ago NMFS takes FEMA to court about the impact of the Floodplain program on fish species – salmon, steelhead, etc. and wins in Washington State.

NMFS then asks FEMA to implement the changes NMFS was concerned with in Washington in Oregon. The BiOp is this effort in a nutshell.







MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT

This is a Memorandum of Agreement made and entered into as of this 29th day of November, 2023 by and between Jefferson County (the "County"), a political subdivision of the State of Oregon, and Martin Fleck (the "Grantee") upon the following terms:

- Agreement. The provisions set forth in a written agreement between the parties hereto dated July 27, 2022 (the "Agreement), are hereby incorporated by reference into this Memorandum.
- 2. Subject Property. The subject property, of which Grantee is the contract buyer, is located at: 35 NW CHERRY LN MADRAS OR 97741, which legal description is:

Tract B of Jefferson County Property Line Adjustment 03-BA-04, as recorded in the official records of Jefferson County as Microfilm No. 2003-02548, being described therein as follows:

A tract of land situated in the Northeast quarter of Section 35, Township 10 South, Range 13 East, Willamette Meridian, Jefferson County, Oregon, more particularly described as follows:

Commencing from the Northeast corner of Section 35, monumented with a 3 ¼" diameter Jefferson County Surveyor Aluminum Cap; thence South 00°07'20" East 30.01 feet along the East line of said Section 35 to a point on the Southerly right-of-way line of Cherry lane; thence along said Southerly right-of-way line South 89°46'32" West 87.13 feet to the True Point of Beginning, being a 5/8" Iron Rod with "SCE&S" Yellow Plastic Cap; thence leaving said Southerly right of way line South 00°07'20" East 357.03 feet; thence South 89°43'38" West 330.12 feet to a point on the Easterly right-of-way line of Highway 26; thence along said right-of-way line North 29°08'03" West 48.67 feet; and North 20°52'18" West 226.45 feet; and North 5°15'55" East 65.19 feet; and North 54°36'26" East 65.82 feet to a point on the Southerly right-of-way line along said Southerly right-of-way line North 89°46'32" East 374.09 feet to the True Point of Beginning.

3. Agreement to Grant a Security Interest. The Grantee has agreed to grant to the County a security interest in the Property to secure certain conditions of the Agreement. Grantee consents to County filing a lien against the property in the event of failure to comply with

the conditions of the Agreement. Grantee acknowledges that it is requesting a phased payment under the Agreement and that its consent to lien is subject to the terms of the Agreement. Any lien filed under this Section shall be a subordinate priority. This agreement to grant a security interest and consent to a lien shall remain in effect until a Certificate of Occupancy is issued for the building that is the subject of the Agreement.

- 4. Purpose. It is expressly understood and agreed by all parties that the sole purpose of this Memorandum of Agreement is to give record notice of the Agreement to place potential secured parties on notice. The Agreement contains and sets forth additional rights, terms, conditions, duties, and obligations not enumerated within this Memorandum. In the event of any inconsistency between the terms of the Agreement and this instrument, the terms of the Agreement shall control. The rights and obligations set forth herein shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties hereto and their respective heirs, representative, successors and assigns.
- 5. Original Agreement. The original Agreement has been recorded in the Jefferson County Clerk Records of the Board of County Commissioners as document M-163-22.

In witness whereof, the parties hereto have executed this Memorandum of Agreement pursuant to due authorization on the dates herein acknowledged.
